Effects of Climate Change upon our Flora and Marine Mammals

Tanya Finney, Superintendent of the South Coast Botanic Garden emphasized the reality of gardening in a drought. Their mission focus is on land reclamation, horticulture and wildlife habitat. The land's history was originally a diatomite mining sight that became a sanitary landfill before Francis Yarmmer, the original founder, petitioned the state and the Department of Parks and Recreation in 1960 to create the grounds we

The gardens have reclaimed the space but its original history as a mine and then a landfill defines what can be done with the space as it is in constant movement with various gas emissions.

climate The in South Coast Botanic California is a uniquely Mediterranean, a micro

climate found in only five other places in the world: the Mediterranean basin in Europe, the southern tip of South Africa, south west Australia and a portion of Chile. This climate is cool and wet in the winter and warm or hot and dry in the summer. Many of the garden's plant collections come from or are similar to these other places.

Classes are offered to the public and free to Los Angeles County students. The emphasis is on drought awareness. The 190 volunteer guides focus heavily on environmental needs.

Water use is monitored by an electronic system which is programmed to stay within the 36% water reduction dictated by the state. Water is used only when an area needs it. The meters turns on and shut off when a section has been watered adequately, to make better use of water resources, avoid overflows and provide a beautiful garden for the public.

If you would like to join as a member or become a volunteer call the Botanic Gardens, you will be assigned according to your abilities.

Kristi Fera, Education Coordinator of the Marine Mammal Care Center at Fort MacArthur, San Pedro, explained the effects climate change has had on marine mammals.

The Care Center is responsible for all 30 beaches in Los Angeles County from Ventura to Seal Beach, it is a hospital which heals and repairs animals brought to it by volunteers.

They take care of pinnipeds: sea lions, harbor seals and elephant seals, no birds.


Seals are not released from the Care Center until they can bark. Barking is their protective device and proves they can open their mouths wide enough to feed on their own, swallow and protect themselves.

In the ocean, climate change means the water has heated up more than 3 degrees. This warming is confusing all the animals, the fish they feed on and their way of living.

The warm water causes harmful algal blooms, known as red tides that produce domoic acid a neurotoxin, which affects smaller fish that the seals eat. Seals eat about 25 pounds of fish daily. Eating toxic fish causes multiple conditions including early death if untreated.

We are seeing unprecedented mortality event in seals, which are dying off by the thousands such that the species is in danger of becoming threatened.

Humans and the plastic we use or throw into the water is another big problem. Seals are always hungry and swallow their food

what is food and what is plastic. The center has autopsied seals and found they have consumed an assortment of plastic throwaways such as: fishing lines, gill nets, plastic bottles, fish hooks, trash bags, Mylar balloons. A typical autopsy showed 20 plastic bags in a seal's stomach. The seal died of hunger.

An example: As baby seals they swim into floating plastic mounds looking for food. They may move into an empty 6-pack ring. It circles the head and cannot be removed. As the seal grows the ring cuts off circulation and causes deformities. The plastic may cut into the necks or eyes or head of the seal causing severe malformations and great pain.

Abandonment problems. Seals generally feed on fish near the beaches. With the water warming, adult nursing seals must swim out farther and farther into the cold waters to catch food. Mother seals must leave their pups on the shore, as pups are not strong enough to swim for long periods of time. When the mothers are gone for too long the pups become delirious with hunger, move away from the beach, fall prey to other animals and usually die, all because of the warm waters.

Volunteers are desperately needed. Anyone interested must be 18 years or older and be willing to sign up for a least one shift a week for a year. To help with a rescue call 1-800-39WHALE.

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Convention Update: Environmental Caucus Adopts Platform Changes By Carol Moeller

In addition to hearing from stars in the political world, political conventions also tackle some serious work. The environmental caucus adopted the following changes to their

1. Old platform: "reduce reliance on coal." New platform: END reliance on coal.

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- 2. Support minimum price guarantees as a method of promoting domestic and entrepreneurial renewable energy production and increase the percentage of renewable energy in California's power mix. Support the right of individuals to generate their own energy; support virtual net metering; expand solar energy production in disadvantaged communities and multi-unit developments; and encourage the growth of individual energy generation. Oppose any attempts to disincentivize the growth of rooftop solar systems. Support government initiatives that allow property owners to finance energy efficiency and renewable energy projects for their homes and commercial buildings;
- 3. Pass SB32 (reduce climate emissions to 40% below 1990 levels by 2030, and to 80% below 1990 levels by 2050).
- 4. Produce 50 percent of the state's transportation fuels from non-petroleum sources, and support Low Carbon Fuel Standards that take into account long-term sustainability.
- 5. 100% clean electricity by 2030!!! "by 2030 produce 100 percent of California's electricity from renewable and sustainable energy sources"
- 6. Oppose new fossil fuel infrastructure projects.

Convention Update: Mobilizing the Millennials By Carol Moeller

Millennial voters are defined as those 35 and under, who were born between the early 1980s and the early 2000s. These youth might only check their physical mail boxes a few times a week, but view their e-mail inboxes hourly. There are 5 million of these voters in California. and 40% of those registered are Democrats. 40% Independent or Decline to State and the remainder register as Republicans or other parties. Only 13% of these individuals are likely to vote, and in some communities, that means they are more likely to be incarcerated than to vote. Republicans Wrest Control of SCAQMD from Democrats — This is Very Bad By Connie Sullivan


Last month the Republicans engineered the ouster of a Democratic mayor from Santa Ana who had sat on the board of the Southern California Air Quality Management District (AQMD), the agency responsible for ensuring four Southern California counties comply with the Clean Air Act.

You may have noticed that for the last 15 years or so we can actually see the mountains to the north of Los Angeles. Remember when they were invisible due to smog? I do.

Well get ready for the return of those good old days. Wasting no time, the Republican majority on the AQMD board voted to oust the longtime Executive Director, Dr. Barry Wallerstein at their very next meeting after ousting the Democrat and placing a Republican on the board.

This is especially worrisome for those of us involved in the Torrance Refinery Action Alliance, as the AQMD has agreed to study the commercial feasibility of banning the deadly toxin, hydrofluoric acid from use by the Torrance refinery and the Valero refinery in Wilmington.

Student Climate Change Education Resolution is Unanimous By Carol Moeller

At our February meeting we passed the Student Climate Change and Education Resolution with a unanimous vote. In May of 2015, the California State PTA adopted a "Climate Change Is a Children's Issue" resolution asking school districts "to educate students on climate and energy literacy and human sustainability"... As a result, and upon the urging of activists around the state, our club voted to adopt the following resolution:

The Palos Verdes Democrats want all high school graduates to know (1) why we have the problem of climate change; (2) its potential for harm; (3) the difference between stabilizing the climate at a livable level and destabilization; (4) science-based, climate-stabilizing, greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets; (5) the primary variables and considerations in identifying those targets and (6) the approximate amount of life style and technology change required to achieve those climate-stabilizing targets.
