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# March Meeting:

## California Changes: Boundaries and Local School Budgets

Successful passage of Propositions that created the California Redistricting Commission has drastically reshaped our political maps. Proposition 30 created another major change. Governor Jerry Brown has now altered the way school districts receive their funds.

At our meeting we will have the privilege of seeing and hearing how the Redistricting Commission went about its mandate. And we will see what is happening to the budget in our own Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District.

"We Drew the Lines" will be presented by two of the 14 Commissioners on the Commission. Mr. Peter Yao, a Republican, and Ms. Jeanne Raya, a Democrat, will show and tell us how they met the challenges they volunteered for. Mr. Yao has been the Mayor of the City of Claremont as well as a member of the City Council. He has degrees in Electrical Engineering from UC Berkeley as well as numerous other universities in California and in New York. He retired from Raytheon Corporation as the Director of Engineering in 2005.

Ms. Raya is employed by the John L. Raya Insurance Agency, a family-owned business established in San Gabriel in 1960. She is an Agency Principal and has numerous responsibilities in that role. She received a Bachelor's Degree and Teaching Credentials from USC and a Law Degree from UC Davis. In private law practice she served as President of the California La Raza

Lawyers Association and as President of the San Gabriel Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Anthony Collatos is the current President of the Board of Education of our school district and an Associate Professor of Education at Pepperdine University. He is one of five members who are elected by the public to four-year terms. Terms are staggered so that two or three seats are open each election.

Proposition 30 won with 55.4% for to 44.6% against. It increases personal income tax on annual earnings over \$250,000 for seven years. It increases sales and use tax by ¼ cent for four years. It also allocates temporary tax revenue 89% to K-12 schools and 11% to community colleges. Proposition 30 spares the District from drastic cuts. However, "it failed to generate new revenue for public schools." It "also did not restore money lost since state school funding began shrinking in 2007," according to the District website.

#### **Environmental History**

Dr. Chris Gantner, a UCLA historian, talked about environmental history being a study of the interaction between the land and the people. In the past, the land was viewed as a resource to be extracted by human beings. Only within the last decade or two have we begun to look at the environment as an active player.

Americans became conscious of the environment in the early part of the twentieth century. This was because drastic changes in the land happened in a way that people could no longer ignore. Dr. Gantner used the 1914 death of Martha, the last passenger pigeon, as an example. Prior to 1914, the number of passenger pigeons was measured in the millions





and people would kill them for their meat and feathers. They seemed to be an inexhaustible source. Yet in 1914, they were completely gone. This sudden loss of a seemingly infinite resource jolted people. They began to realize the importance of preservation and conservation and also began to connect the environment to some kind of spiritual life that was also in decline. People started to ask the question: where do we go when the world reaches the breaking point?

Dr. Gantner believes that we are at a point where a true environmental policy has a chance of being formulated and implemented. However, we should be cognizant of our cultural bias and try to correctly assess the environment to the best of our ability. Only then will we be able to come up with a viable strategy to push the policy forward.

#### 350.org

Club VP Hans Grellmann introduced 350.org, an organization founded by Bill McKibben. 350.org holds rallies and demonstrations all over the world to make people aware of climate change. A huge climate rally organized by 350.org and the Sierra Club is being held on the National Mall in Washington, DC on the same day

as our club meeting. A concurrent rally is being held in Los Angeles.

The big push right now is to stop the Keystone XL Pipeline project. The project is to transport tar sand-derived oil from Canada to the Gulf Coast. Deriving oil from tar sand involves bulldozing forests, pumping steam into the ground, or doing mountain top removal. It is an environmental disaster. If there is a spill, toxic gases will be emitted.

#### Climate Math

Bill McKibben came up with a clever way to explain climate change. It is called Climate Math. There are four numbers associated with it:

2 - The maximum temperature rise of the Earth's atmosphere in Centigrade. Beyond 2°C, humanity will not be able to survive.

565 - The amount of carbon in billion tons we can burn before reaching 2°C.

5 times - Proven fossil fuel reserves are five times as large as the above allowance. If we keep burning carbon at the current rate, we will reach 565 billion tons in 18 years.

80 - The amount in percentage of fossil fuel we should leave in the ground. If we can do that, the fossil fuel industry will be completely out of business in 36 years. It is the solution to combat climate change.

Hans briefly touched upon on how to frame the discussion on climate change. He prefers to use the term Catastrophic Climate Change.

#### **Climate Reality**


The speaker was Al Sattler, chair of Palos Verdes-South Bay Sierra Club. He used a continued on page 3

series of slides and videos to illustrate the destruction caused by disastrous climate change in the world. He showed slides on flooding in Pakistan, Australia, China, the Korean Peninsula, the US, India, etc. The flooding was caused by heavy downpours due to the increased moisture concentration in the air. As the Earth's temperature rises, more water evaporates from ocean into the Earth's atmosphere, hence the increased moisture content. The rise in temperature will also cause more water to evaporate from soil and create severe drought and dust storms.

The increased carbon dioxide concentration in the atmosphere is the main culprit for global warming. When there is no excessive burning of fossil fuel, the generation of carbon dioxide is more or less offset by the consumption of that gas. With the increased burning of fossil fuel, more carbon dioxide is added to the air and hence the increase in the Earth's temperature.

Higher temperatures also impact crop production such as rice. The extreme heat could cause rice to be sterilized. It will also turn more farmland into desert and cause serious fires.

Al warned that we have to do something about climate change now. The technology to solve the climate crisis is available; what lacks is the political will. Nevertheless, he is hopeful.
