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

#### May Meeting

*Pay 2 Play: Democracy's High Stakes*, a documentary about the influence of money in politics



Writer/director John Wellington Ennis illustrates the effects of the Citizen's United decision, ultimately building a case for eliminating corporate personhood and money as free speech.

In addition to educating the audience as to how this 5-4 decision has affected the elections in swing state Ohio, he also suggests actions that he isn't himself afraid to take. He asks the question "What will you do to make your vote count?" He considers that one person can and does make a difference, and a large enough group of single people each making a difference can and will change the world.

#### April Meeting Report

President Carol Moeller opened the meeting with a reminder to everyone that this is Earth Week and in honor of that our speakers today would be talking about water issues and about the marine protected areas along our coast.

Rascha Hall spoke briefly about the upcoming April 26 fundraiser for Help the Homeless Help Themselves. HHHT has raised and distributed over \$2.5 million to the homeless over the last 20 years. HHHT's fundraiser will be a dinner and silent auction with performance by opera singer Jerrilyn Glass.

#### West Basin Municipal Water District Representative Harold Williams

Harold began his talk by explaining that West Basin Municipal Water District is a water wholesaler that receives water from the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) and sells it to the various water purveyors in the area.

In 1947 the West Basin District was formed to stop the over pumping of water that had led to seawater infiltrating our local aquifers. Prior to that the MWD had been formed by 26 local cities, which make up the only members of the MWD forevermore apparently, so everyone else (Carson and Palos Verdes Peninsula included) had to form their own wholesalers, to purchase from the MWD.

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The leadership of West Basin is 5 elected directors, and Harold is our District Director.

We have never have had enough water locally to sustain us since the 1930's, when Mulholland brought water from 200 miles away. Now we rely on imported water for 66% of our supply.

Harold is very proud of West Basin's water recycling program that produces 5 qualities of water that allow us to save precious drinking water from being used for industrial uses or for replenishing the sea water injection wells.

He showed a number of slides with graphic information about how bad our drought is.

Because of the dire situation the Governor issued the first-ever executive order restricting water usage. West Basin will receive 15% less of their usual water allocation.

The remainder of his talk described the many water conservation programs the West Basin District has been doing over the decades. Since 1995, it has reduced water usage by 27%. In fact, the West Basin has been a leader in water conservation.

In addition to the water recycling program they have a turf removal program that pays homeowners \$3.00 per square foot to remove their grass. They have rain barrels, low flow showerheads and toilets and weather sensitive sprinklers, all to help residents conserve.

West Basin has a Water Reliability 20/20 program, with the goal of reducing imported water by 2 times from 66% to 33% and increasing conservation efforts by 2 times, and by increasing the use of recycled water by 2 times.

They did have a goal to build an ocean desalination plant but will not be able to do so at this time. However, the Governor's budget has funding for desalination and they may be able to revive that plan in the future, when it becomes cost effective.

Harold concluded by inviting everyone to visit the water recycling plant in El Segundo.

### **RPV Mayor Jim Knight**

Mayor Knight started by mentioning that he has an urban planning background and approaches the water problem a bit differently than the engineers who work in this area.

He made the point that the agricultural water usage in the state accounts for 80% and until we tackle that we can't really solve the problem. However, many farmers have water rights and it's very difficult to tackle agricultural usage for that reason.


In terms of what the city of RPV has been doing to conserve water, Mayor Knight mentioned they had cut water usage by 20% last year. They have identified drought resistant turf areas they can plant. They are reviewing agricultural controls and technology. They are looking at water usage in their municipal buildings. They are doing grass recycling by mulching cut grass where it's cut and not hauling away. This also helps with the city's carbon footprint because they are not expending gasoline to haul away the grass.

The city is enhancing its website to educate residents on what they can do. Still, He's not sure they can reduce another 15%.

### **Marine Protected Areas -- Michael Schaadt from Cabrillo Marine Aquarium**

Mr. Schaadt is the Director of Cabrillo Marine Aquarium, which was established 80 years ago.

It so happens that Schaadt was a commercial lobster fisherman many years ago for a short time, so he's not anti-fisherman. However, Schaadt wants our kids and grandkids to be able to eat the fish off our coast, as we have been able to do.

Schaadt pointed out that we have had laws on the books that regulate how and when we fish –the fish have to be a certain size, they can be caught only at certain times of the year, and a fisherman can catch only so many fish at a time. These haven't worked. The fish are smaller and less numerous these days than in the past. We need to look at other options.

The California Marine Life Protection Act passed in 1999. It created a network of marine protection areas along the 1100-mile California coast. These areas are designed to feed each other. For example, baby fishes may reach each other between protected areas. Marine reserves are not new, but the idea of a network is fairly new. In 2003, the Marine Protective Areas were developed through a public-private process. Stakeholders came together and created three types of areas: reserves, parks and conservation areas. In a reserve, it is illegal to fish at all, however, research and educational activities may be allowed. In a park, commercial fishing is not allowed, but recreational fishing is. In a conservation area, some recreational and some commercial fishing are allowed.

In Los Angeles County Abalone Cove and Pt. Vicente are the marine protected areas. Even though Rocky Point was judged by scientists to be the best area to protect, fisherman won out and Rocky Point was not designated a protected area.

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These areas will be reviewed every 5 -10 years to see if they are functioning as planned.

The aquariums up and down the coast are educating the public about these areas, which are really underwater parks, similar to our land parks. Each year there is an Underwater Parks Day in January, set aside to educate the public about these parks.

One way to know if the reserves are working will be to determine how many "fat old female fish" are found there. Older females produce many more baby fish and stronger fish than smaller, younger females. A 19-year-old female will produce 1.7 million babies.

Schaadt ended his talk by answering a number of questions about the safety of local fish consumption.

## What...We're voting on Bylaws Again?


## Book Review

***HRC; State Secrets and the Rebirth of Hillary Clinton*** by Jonathan Allen and Amie Parnes



This book begins just as Hillary loses the primary to Barack Obama, and follows her as she prepares to continue as a Senator. It details



her initial reluctance to accept the Secretary of State position and the intense behind-the-scenes wooing of Hillary and the smart counter-requests she asks for and gets. Interesting details are conveyed, such as Obama's choice of Timothy Geithner as Treasury Secretary due in part to Geithner's ability to speak Mandarin (his major at Dartmouth involved Asian studies and he studied at universities in Beijing ). These assets aligned with Obama's desire to encourage Chinese investment in the US. The many layers of political maneuvering play out as former opponents, Hillary and Obama, eventually succeed in forming a close friendship. Hillary's deft diplomatic abilities resulted in many former foes actually forming alliances with her that aided her in her role as Secretary of State and likely will be beneficial in her run for President. The Benghazi tragedy, which her opponents are trying to use to define her, is thoroughly examined. Although some critics claim this book is simply a tool to help elect Hillary, I view it as a fascinating window into the machinery that defines our political system.
